The PCEE is currently accepting applications for two \$1,000 scholarships to attend the North American Association for Environmental Education (NAAEE) conference. The conference will be held in Albuquerque, New Mexico from October 25-29, 2005. The theme this year is "Sustainability and Environmental Education: Focus on the Future." These scholarships are available to any college or university faculty or administrator that wants to increase the inclusion of environmental content knowledge (per Pennsylvania Department of Education Environment and Ecology standards) or increase the inclusion of environmental education teaching methods for pre-service education students.

The PCEE is providing this opportunity as part of the Environmental Education Inclusion in Teacher Preparation Project. The goal of this project is to institutionalize environmental education in teacher preparation for Pennsylvania.

Huplits Grant Available for Education to Protect PA Habitats and Wildlife

Huplits Wildlife Grants are administered by the Sierra Club to help protect wildlife and its habitat in Pennsylvania. For 2005 the total funds available for the annual Huplits Wildlife Grant Competition amount to about \$72,000.

Preference will be given to projects that will have the greatest potential impact on the long-term protection or enhancement of wildlife and/or its habitat in Pennsylvania. The project may involve public education, litigation, scientific research, land acquisition, etc.

Credit will be given to projects that foster involvement of Sierra Club grassroots activists in the protection of wildlife and its habitat. Projects will normally be funded for no more than two years, but under special circumstances a project may be extended.

The number of grants awarded is not fixed, but may vary from one to eight. A project proposal should describe the overall goal, objectives, major activities, resources required, timelines, and a reasonably detailed budget. Special attention should be given to the measurable benefits of the project.

EETAP Offers On-Line Environmental Education Course Franchise to Higher Education

The Environmental Education and Training Partnership (EETAP) and the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point have developed an on-line course entitled "Fundamentals of Environmental Education." Course developers and reviewers included six past presidents of the North American Association for Environmental Education (NAAEE). The course is based on NAAEE's *Guidelines for the Initial Preparation of Environmental Educators*.

EETAP is interested in increasing the number of educators that receive environmental education training and we believe this on-line course will help accomplish that. We want to make the course available to universities across the country so they can provide environmental education training to their students.

The University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point has offered this course the last six semesters and has had excellent feedback from the students. Students from 47 states and from as far away as Peru and Pakistan have completed the course. The Charles A. and Anne Morrow Lindbergh Foundation

Each year, The Charles A. and Anne Morrow Lindbergh Foundation provides grants of up to \$10,580 (a symbolic amount representing the cost of the "Spirit of St. Louis") to men and women whose individual initiative and work in a wide spectrum of disciplines furthers the Lindberghs' vision of a balance between the advance of technology and the preservation of the natural/human environment.

Each year, The Charles A. and Anne Morrow Lindbergh Foundation solicits applications for Lindbergh Grants from the U.S. and abroad. Approximately 200 formal grant applications are received each year.

Categories

Lindbergh Grants are made in the following categories: agriculture; aviation/aerospace; conservation of natural resources - including animals, plants, water, and general conservation (land, air, energy, etc.); education - including humanities/education, the arts, and intercultural communication; exploration; health - including biomedical research, health and population sciences, and adaptive technology; and waste minimization and management. A Jonathan Lindbergh Brown Grant may be given to a project to support adaptive technology or biomedical research which seeks to redress imbalance between an individual and his or her human environment.
